

Walsall Council is the managing authority for the borough of Walsall and can assist you in a number of ways, including the following:

COUNCIL TAX

If you are 18 or over and own or rent a home, you will usually have to pay council tax. It is your responsibility to make sure you register and pay council tax.

You will get 25% off your bill if you count as an adult for council tax and either:

- you live on your own
- no-one else in your home counts as an adult

You will usually get a 50% discount if no-one living in your home, including you, counts as an adult.

There are a few ways you can pay your council tax:

- set up a direct debit using the council tax online system
- pay online using your online payment system
- pay by phone using the payment line on 0300 555 2852

BINS AND RECYCLING

You are responsible for ensuring that your household waste is disposed of in a proper manner and most households in Walsall are provided with the following:

- Grey bins for general waste
- Green bins for recycling cartoon, paper, cans, plastic and glass
- Brown bins for garden waste

Large and bulky items should be taken to one of the two household waste recycling centres in Walsall:

- Fryers Road Household Waste Recycling Centre, Bloxwich
- Merchants Way Household Waste Recycling Centre, Aldridge

When recycling make sure you dispose of confidential or personal information such as bills or bank statements appropriately. Your rubbish and recycling bins are not secure; be vigilant about identity theft.

2 HEALTH AND WELLBEING

REGISTER WITH A GP

A GP is a local family doctor. You need to register with a GP as soon as you can when you arrive in England so you can see the GP when you are sick.

There is no charge to register with a GP in England. Once you are registered, there is also no charge to see your GP.

Go into your local surgery and ask if they are accepting new patients. You will need to complete a form (GMS1) which includes basic information such as:

- Name and address
- Date of birth
- NHS number (if you have one)
- Other information, such as the name and address of your previous doctor

Some doctors' surgeries will also ask to see proof of your identity, you may be required to provide at least one of the documents below when registering:

- Passport
- Birth certificate
- Biometric residence permit
- Travel document
- HC2 certificate
- ARC card
- Utility bill

LOCAL HOSPITAL/ACCIDENT & EMERGENCY SERVICE

Walsall Manor Hospital is the only provider of NHS acute care in the borough, providing accident and emergency as well as inpatient and outpatient services 24 hours a day 7 days a week.

URGENT CARE CENTRE

Walsall Urgent Care Centre (UCC) is located on the site of the Manor Hospital. This service provides fast, expert care for injuries and illnesses that are not life-threatening but are too urgent to wait for a routine appointment with the GP.

FIND A PHARMACY IN YOUR AREA

For a range of minor illnesses, such as coughs, colds, sore throats, tummy trouble and aches and pains, as well as dispensing of NHS prescriptions, you can seek advice at your local pharmacy. Many pharmacies are open until late and at weekends. To find your local pharmacy and information about opening hours visit www.nhs.uk/service-search/find-a-pharmacy.

REGISTER WITH A DENTIST

Most dentists provide both NHS and private dental treatment. Make sure you understand whether you are paying for NHS or private treatment, or a mixture of the two, before treatment begins.

You are automatically entitled to free NHS prescriptions and NHS dental treatment if you are:

- under 16
- 16, 17 or 18 and in full time education
- in receipt of certain benefits or you are named on the claim as a partner or child.

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

Mental health services are free on the NHS, but in some cases you will need a referral from your GP to access them.

For help or advice from a GP after office hours phone your local surgery. They will have a recorded message telling you what to do.

REPORT MODERN SLAVERY/HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Modern slavery or human trafficking is the movement of a person from one place to another (this could be country to country, town to town, or even as simple as one room in a building to another) and it could involve exploitation, deception, abuse of power or the abuse of a person's vulnerability.

Forced labour is the most common form of slavery in the UK.

If you suspect someone is a victim of modern slavery, you have a few options:

If someone is in immediate danger, always call 999.

REPORT DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND ABUSE

You do not have to wait for an emergency situation to find help. If domestic abuse is happening to you, it is important to tell someone and remember you are not alone.

REPORT CHILD ABUSE OR NEGLECT

If you suspect that a child or young person is being, or is at risk of being, significantly harmed as a result of abuse or neglect, you must report this immediately.

During office hours (08:45 to 17:15 on Mondays to Thursdays, 08:45 to 16:45 on Fridays) call the Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub on 0300 555 2866.

Read your tenancy agreement carefully before signing.

Always check whether you are allowed to alter a property. Sub-letting is not normally allowed.

You have a right to report unfair treatment by a landlord or risks to yourself in properties.

5 CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE

SCHOOL ADMISSION

Compulsory school age begins at the start of the term following a child's fifth birthday and may conclude on the last Friday in June of the school year when s/he turns 16 years. Primary education is from 5-11 years; secondary education is from 11-16 years. If a child is not in paid employment at this point, then they must stay in education, start an apprenticeship or work as a volunteer until they are 18.

Parents and carers can submit their application online or in person to the Admission and Appeals team in the Walsall Council.

CHILDCARE

There are lots of different types of childcare in Walsall that you can use depending on your situation and need.

All 3 and 4-year-olds in England are entitled to 570 hours of free early education or childcare a year. This is often taken as 15 hours each week for 38 weeks of the year. Some 2-year-olds are also eligible.

6 FINDING A JOB AND IMPROVING YOUR SKILLS

NATIONAL INSURANCE NUMBER

If you plan to work, apply for a student loan or claim benefits in the UK, you must apply for a National Insurance number. You can only apply once you are in the UK and have the right to work or right to study in the UK.

Call the National Insurance number application line for England, Scotland and Wales between 08:00 and 18:00 on 0800 141 2075 or 0800 141 2438 (Textphone).

After you have applied you will get a letter from the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) asking you to come to a National Insurance number interview at Jobcentre Plus.

The letter will also tell you which documents to bring to prove your identity such as a passport or identity card, residence permit, birth or adoption certificate, marriage or civil partnership certificate or driving licence.

If you change your address before you get your letter, tell DWP by contacting the National Insurance number application line.

You can start work before your National Insurance number arrives if you can prove you can work in the UK. You should tell your employer that you have applied for one and give it to them when you have it.

SET UP A BANK ACCOUNT

Without a bank account you might find it difficult to pay bills, receive your salary and register for services in the UK.

To open a bank account, you will have to fill in an application form in a branch or on line, sometimes you can also do this over the phone.

Whether you are applying for your first account as a young person or as someone who is newly resident in the UK, you will need to provide documents to prove both your identity and your address.

7 YOUR RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

REGISTER TO VOTE

You can only vote at elections if you are on the electoral register for the area you wish to vote in. You only need to register once, unless you change your address, name or nationality.

If you do change address, name or nationality, you need to register to vote again.

To register to vote, you must be:

- a UK or Irish citizen
- a qualifying Commonwealth citizen living in the UK
- an EU citizen living in the UK

You must be aged 16 or over (or 14 or over in Scotland) to register to vote although you will not be able to vote until you are 18.

You are now able to apply to register online (it should take around 5 minutes) or using a paper form: www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.

You can also ring the Electoral Registration Office in Walsall on 01922 652502 and apply over the telephone.

You will be asked for your National Insurance number (but you can still register if you do not have one), your personal details, name, address and date of birth.

After you have registered, your name and address will appear on the electoral register and you will be able to vote in local and general elections or referendums.

TV LICENCE

By law, you must have a TV licence in the UK if you:

- watch or record programmes on a TV, computer or other device as they are broadcast
- download or watch BBC programmes on iPlayer – live, catch up or on demand

A TV licence costs £157.50 (£53 for black and white TV sets) for both homes and businesses.

You can be fined up to £1,000 if you watch or record live TV without a TV licence.

DRIVING IN THE UK

To drive a motor vehicle in the UK you must:

- have a valid licence that covers the category of vehicle you are driving
- have insurance that covers you for the vehicle you are driving
- have a valid MOT certificate (if your car is older than three years)
- make sure the vehicle is taxed
- make sure the vehicle is registered
- make sure the vehicle is in roadworthy condition

Your vehicle must be registered and taxed with the Driver and Vehicle Licensing Agency (DVLA), access www.gov.uk/vehicle-registration/new-and-used-vehicles to register your vehicle online or to find out how you can do it by post.

You must have UK insurance for a UK-registered vehicle.

You can drive in Great Britain for only 12 months if you got your EU licence by exchanging your non-EU licence.

When driving, it is illegal to use your mobile phone or drive under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

It is also illegal to smoke in a car with anyone under 18 years of age.

All children under 12 years and under 135cm in height must use a child car seat or booster seat.

8 IMMIGRATION

EU CITIZENS IN THE UK AFTER BREXIT

The UK has left the European Union. If you are an EU citizen and plan to continue living, working and studying in the UK, you will need to apply for permission to remain under the 'EU Settlement Scheme'.

The Scheme is a free UK Home Office application process that nearly all EU citizens residing in the UK and their family members, must complete to be able to continue to stay lawfully in the UK.

Failure to apply under this Scheme before the application deadline of 30 June 2021, means that your future residence in the UK may be unlawful. Therefore, all EU citizens and their family members who arrive before the end of the transition period and intend to stay in the UK after 31 December 2020, must apply for this new UK immigration status.

APPLYING FOR EU SETTLEMENT SCHEME

You need to complete a short 3-step online application form using a computer, tablet or mobile phone on: www.gov.uk/settled-status-eu-citizensfamilies/applying-for-settled-status.

The Home Office application checks: your identity, your residence in the UK and any criminal record you may have. You will need to use 'EU Exit: ID Document Check' app to scan your documents: <https://www.gov.uk/guidance/using-the-eu-exit-id-document-check-app>

The deadline for applying is 30 June 2021. You must usually have started living in the UK by 31 December 2020.

Those who have lived in the UK for less than 5 years will have to apply for temporary 'Pre-Settled Status'. This will allow them to stay in the UK and apply for 'Settled Status' once they achieve the 5 years of continuous residence.

EU citizens and their family members who have been continually resident in the UK for at least 5 years should get 'Settled Status'.

After you apply to the EU Settlement Scheme, the Home Office will email you a decision letter to tell you what status they have given you. If your application is successful under the Scheme, you will be granted 'Settled' or 'Pre-Settled Status' depending on how long you have lived in the UK before your application.

The Home Office will contact you if they need more information from you before they make a decision.

ASYLUM AND REFUGEES

An asylum seeker is someone who comes to the UK, often fleeing persecution, torture or war, and applies for refugee status. Until refugee status is granted, such a person remains an asylum seeker and may be entitled to accommodation and support under the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999.

You must apply for asylum if you want to stay in the UK as a refugee.

You should apply when you arrive in the UK or as soon as you think it would be unsafe for you to return to your own country. Your application is more likely to be denied if you wait.

When you apply you'll have a meeting with an immigration officer (known as a 'screening').

After your screening the Home Office will decide if your claim can be considered in the UK. If it can, you'll have an asylum interview with a caseworker.

You will usually get a decision on your application within 6 months.

If you are homeless, you should inform the Home Office of your/your family's needs. After the screening interview the Home Office will consider whether to place you in temporary accommodation.

APPLYING FOR BRITISH CITIZENSHIP

British citizenship gives you the right to live and work in the UK permanently, without any immigration restrictions.

Before you apply you need to have permission to live in the UK permanently - for example, getting indefinite leave to remain or 'settled status' from the EU Settlement Scheme. You need to do this even if your husband, wife or civil partner is a British citizen.

If you want to become a British Citizen, there are different ways to apply based on your circumstances. Visit www.citizensadvice.org.uk/immigration/ to learn about the process and find out if you are eligible.


